 - O How do we serve them?


Getting Practical

Practical considerations to use in rethinking your school's mission and vision statement

- Considerable amount of self reflection-Honest blunt and detailed.
- Use measurable input and not subjective or anecdotal.
- Consider where you are and where to are hoping to go. (platonic vs. actual)
- Use parent surveys and focus groups
- Numbers of references, referrals, or publications
- Staff critique



Sample Mission Statements



The Institute for Catholic Liberal Education inspires and equips Catholic educators to renew today's Catholic schools by drawing on the Church's tradition of education, which frees teachers and students for the joyful pursuit of faith, wisdom, and virtue.

Common Core Mission Statement

"The Common Core State Standards provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. The standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in college and careers. Branding the School

- Most important aspect of branding your school is the *mission statement*.
- Your mission statement should be everywhere.
- Have short, concise statements about what makes your school stand out from the others.
- Keep your collateral materials consistent, simple, and beautiful.
- Highlight Truth, Goodness and Beauty, and of course, the commitment to authentic Catholic education.

N.B. -- Apologia, if needed. In the early years of founding or renewal, other local Catholic schools often think your school is reactionary, more Catholic than the pope, etc. They feel threatened, as if your existence is a barb shouting "that parish school is not Catholic enough." A good tactic many schools have used to promote good will and unity is to emphasize that 'our school just uses a different educational model, one that some people want. We support our other Catholic schools, but ours is like a Catholic charter school, specializing in classical education.'

Devotion to Our Lady

The fleur de lis is a traditional symbol for Mary as is the color blue. Since it has also been used to represent French royalty, the fleur de lis also connects to our Queen Mother's apparition at Lourdes, France in 1858.

Joyful Fidelity

The top of the fleur de lis (flower of the lily) doubles as a Bishop's miter, representing the authority of Christ the King handed down through the Apostles to today's Bishops. We are joyfully faithful to the Magisterium of the Catholic Church

Discipleship Formation

Overlaying the fleur de lis is the Shield of Faith topped by the Crown of Martyrdom. Our Lady always leads us to her Son, and we seek to form disciples of Christ the King, prepared to "drop their nets" and bear witness to His victory over death.

Classical Training

Our integrated intellectual and spiritual formation fosters a love for verum, pulchrum and bonum (the true, the beautiful and the good). The merging of the natural order of the universe with the supernatural revelation of the Incarnation is represented by the Star of the Magi.

Family Centered

The Magi discovered the Christ child in the context of the Holy Family. We serve the family, supporting parents in their God-given role as the primary educators of their children.

Spread the word through your mission



- Go tell it on the mountain! Ask any nearby parish that does not have a school attached if you can be present at weekend Masses to share information about your school.
- Hold forums and panel discussions explaining the vision and mission.
- Ask you **pastor** to help you with this. He can speak with his brother priests and get them excited about the mission of your school. Have him invite other pastors to come tour the school with him.
- When you meet with **new parents**, share the mission with them and ask them to share their thoughts on it.

Discussion Questions

- 1. What are the metrics used to determine if a Mission is being lived and permeated within a school's culture or if it is unknown?
- 2. Which hill do you want to die on? What are your non negotiable core factors that go in into your mission/vision?
- 3. What aspects of your school community, traditions and culture might be altered by a new or refined mission/vision?
- 4. Is there a particular catchphrase or one question you could create and use that would help the staff and parents be unified behind the mission? Meaning, when someone brings a concern or and idea to you is there something simple you can use to remind them of the focus and direction of the school?
- 5. How does one know if the school mission or vision needs to be rebranded in conjunction with a shift to a liberal arts curriculum?

Scenarios

- I. A new parent comes to you a week after you have been hired as headmaster and volunteers that she would love to be on the HSA board because she has experience being a room mother and sells cosmetics so she knows how to sell people on anything and communicate well. She also informs you that her husband is a math professor at a local university and has some ideas on improving the math curriculum. How will you respond?
- 2. A recent review of your schools updated demographics shows that your school is now 55% Catholic and 45% Evangelical. During a team review of your core principles, your administrators says it is likely time to remove the word Catholic from you mission/vision statements and go for something more ecumenical. What is your next comment?
- 3. A parent sends you data from a straw poll of all parents telling you that they would like for your school to provide pre-SAT practice tests monthly to increase scores for your students. What is your response?
- 4. A new teacher comes to you and says that they want to manage the social media for your school. You do not have anyone currently doing this so your interest is piqued. How will you guide her to ensure that content and the quality aligns with the mission and vision?
- 5. You take a job as principal of a school you have never worked in before. A month in, you quickly learn that the culture of the school is quite different from the mission and vision on found on paper and used during the hiring process. How will you pivot to bring this school back to life?
