
OPENING PRAYER





The Vocation of Catholic Leadership


Catholic education is not just a job, it is a vocation.

A school's Catholic identity depends on the effective leader *formation*.

Competent and capable leaders are able to address other needs like **finance**, **governance**, **and recruitment**.

Faith filled Catholic leaders keep **Catholic** identity strong, set a **positive** tone, and bring the **community** together.

True leadership is founded on these realities...It begins with the truth of who we are, of who God is, of what our true state is, and of what God is doing about it. Those who wish to make a difference through their leadership, whatever the context, will follow the prescriptions given us by Christ, our true physician. They will want to find out how to participate in Christ's leadership. They will need to resist the utopian temptation, not because they don't care about the state of the human race, but precisely because they care about it so much. (page 36)



1. Christian Conviction: Who Am I Following?






What skills are necessary in leadership?

 - 6.Listen first, respond later.
 - 7.Bring joy to everything.



The vision statement for Catholic Schools should come right out of Church teaching. If our sights are set on the Truth of the Magisterium, we can use the Church to act as our guiding compass.




"It is therefore as important to make no mistake in education, as it is to make no mistake in the pursuit of the last end, with which the whole work of education is intimately and necessarily connected.






1. Inspired by a Supernatural Vision

- Forms the whole child for heaven
- Good citizens in this world and the world to come
- Teaching the truthconcerning the human person
- Intentional focus on the inalienable dignity of the human person; above all the spiritual dimension


2. Founded on a Christian Anthropology

Christ is the Teacher in Catholic schools.

- Christian anthropology is understanding the human person as made in the image and likeness of God.

Comparison of the Two Philosophies

Contemporary Education

- Ordered to material, temporal ends
- Fragmented, industrialized
- Focus on practical skills
- Emphasis on information
- One mile wide, one inch deep
- Lectures+testing = passive learning
- Susceptible to indoctrination

Catholic Liberal Education

- Ordered to eternal happiness
- Integration of subjects, knowledge, faith
- Restores meaning and purpose
- Formation; awakens wonder
- Cultivates habits of deep thinking
- Constant discussion = active learning
- Develops intellectual freedom


3. Animated by Community

The Holy See describes the school as a community, "a genuine community of faith," in four areas:

- 1. Teamwork among all those involved
- 2. Cooperation between educators and bishops
- 3. Interaction of students with teachers
- 4. Physical environment




Guiding Principles for creating a beautiful school environment

- 1. Create spaces that offer freedom
- 2. Create spaces that are well ordered, ordered towards Truth (microcosm of the universe)
- 3. Keep it simple; over stimulation makes it difficult to focus
- 4. Select beautiful works of art and furniture
- 5. Give teachers options as a way to guide them
- 6. Incorporate nature, stay grounded in reality
- 7. Direct everything towards Heaven


4. Imbued with a Catholic Worldview Throughout its Curriculum


- Catholicism is a "comprehensive way of life" that should animate every aspect of its activities and its curriculum.
- If a Catholic school is to deliver on its promise to provide students with an integral education, it must foster love for wisdom and truth, and must integrate faith, culture, and life.

Practical (and simple!) tips to begin integration

- Offer teachers of different disciplines time to work together and plan lessons that bring in other disciplines.
- Pick thoughtful poetry for students to memorize
- Language is the medium for thought, think through ELA program
- Begin with simple Latin
- Imitate the greats
- Select good literature
- Math should be a combination of rote memory and question based learning


Dr. Greg Roper's 4 Points on "HOW TO TEACH ANYTHING"

- 1. You can teach anything if you can remember when you didn't know it; imagine and remember your way back to ignorance.
- 2. "Seventy percent of what you teach is yourself." (Hoyt Duggan)
- 3. You have to want them "not to need you." (Wayne Booth)
- 4. You have to love them into wonder.


5. Sustained by Gospel Witness

- Vital witness of teachers and administrators- the primary responsibility for creating a Christian school climate, as individuals and as a community.
- Children will pick up far more by the example of their educators than by masterful pedagogical techniques, especially in the practice of Christian virtue.

Reclaiming the Nobility and Simplicity of the Vocation of Teaching

10 Basic Points:

1. Pray everyday:

"Pray as if everything depends on God, act as if everything depends on you"

2. Be in love with what you're teaching:

"There is no such thing as a boring subject, just boring teachers." Chesterton

3. Be bold: "Be not afraid!" Pope St. John Paul II

4. Reject utilitarianism: "The glory of God is man fully alive!" St. Irenaeus

5. Be a lifelong learner: respect your profession

- 6. Limit technology: remove the obstacles that impede authentic education and harm the formation of the imagination.*
- 7. Be joyful: "Joy is the net of love by which we catch souls!" St. Teresa of Calcutta
- 8. Restore humanity: Engage the **5 senses**, treat *every* student with **dignity**
- 9. Live a sacrificial life: everyday is the opportunity to pick up the cross and follow the Master Teacher

10. Pray everyday - (yes, we said this before, but it should be the beginning and ending of all, in good times and in bad.)




The weight of the Mission Statement







Reviewing the Mission...where to begin?

1. Include your Pastor or Priest involved with your school.

- 2. Timing is everything! Setting aside time to discuss vision and mission with your staff encourages their buy-in to the authentically Catholic school with direct actions that will need to be taken.
- 3. Begin with sharing Church documents with the staff.

4. Put action behind the words you choose!




Every Catholic school should look this way....


Creating a Mission Statement

- Invoke your school's patron
- Your school's mission statement is the filter through which every decision must **flow** in order to maintain integrity- from hiring, to dealing with parents, curriculum to extracurricular activities- everything that affects your school must support your mission statement.



Creating a Mission Statement

- Offer concrete wording that can be defined and has depth; vague statements lead to misguided decisions.
- Keep in mind that your mission statement sets the tone for the culture of your school and what things will look like day to day, year after year.
- Take pride in the richness of your mission statement. It is there to support you!



Include Parents Properly

Church teaching demands it:


"Since parents have given children their life, they are bound by the most serious obligation to educate their offspring and therefore must be recognized as the primary and principal educators. This role in education is so important that only with difficulty can it be supplied where it is lacking. Parents are the ones who must create a family atmosphere animated by love and respect for God and man, in which the well-rounded personal and social education of children is fostered."



 - Rigor in curriculum
 - Family life
 - End goal



In Summary

- We have everything we need in Church documents to reclaim and renew Catholic education to what it should be!
- Our mission and vision statements set the tone of doing this at our schools and create a culture that is authentically Catholic, focused on the whole child, and offers rigor that sets us apart from other schools.
- We have the opportunity as school leaders to begin the renewal in our own communities through our vision and mission of the school. This is a great honor and responsibility.
- As Catholic school leaders we are tasked to lead our communities, as the Church has asked us to do, to understand more deeply the fullness and beauty of teaching faith and reason.

Beginning the Year with Vision

Our vision rejects the modern utilitarian view of education's purpose being the development of technical career skills. Instead we have returned to the original purpose of education – now referred to as "classical". This vision begins with a correct anthropology of fallen but redeemed man and seeks to "draw out" (Latin: educare) what is natural: a desire for wisdom and virtue, which are more conducive to our authentic destiny, the end for which we were created. In short, students are prepared for heaven by building the habits to choose rightly, judging by the intellect after acquiring knowledge naturally through the senses.

The Catholic education we envision seeks a proper balance to academics and catechesis. Our integrated curriculum provides simultaneous intellectual and spiritual formation by immersing students in God's love found both in the complex ordered beauty of the universe and in the authentic fullness of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Ironically, this integrated "liberal arts" education in excellence not only forms saints, but beholding Truth for its own sake is the best way to develop practical skills as well. For students are "in this world, but not of this world"
