

Oftentimes, after a brief introduction to Catholic classical liberal arts education (or, more simply, *Catholic education*), many educators will respond with, "We already do that." We have found this to be the case because the intentions and desires of most dedicated, well-meaning Catholic educators are in alignment with the Church's vision. Sadly, by no fault of their own, they have been cut off from the Church's time-tested approach, rooted in the classical liberal arts and sciences. Instead, they have been subjected to a secular, industrialized model of education that discourages teachers and fails to inspire students. It is essential to understand these differences.
