II-Greek Tragedy

Aeschylus (458 BC)

- Oresteia or Orestian Trilogy
- It concerns the murder of Agamemnon by Clytemnestra, the murder of Clytemnestra by Orestes, the trial of Orestes, the end of the curse on the House of Atreus
- The trilogy consists of Agamemnon, The Libation Bearers or Choepheri and the Eumenides.
- For things happen as Zeus determined, he who moves and perfects everything. For what could take place apart from Zeus? And as for this that has happened, is it not God's doing? (Agamemnon, 1486-88)

Greek History-Herodotus (440 BC)

Herodotus of Halicarnissus here displays his inquiry, so that human achievements may not be forgotten in time, and that great and marvelous deeds...may not be without their glory.

Heraclitus-(535-475 BC)-You never enter the same river twice Parmenides-(b. 515 BC)

Greek History-Thucydides-Peloponnesian Wars-431-404BC
