Plenary Sessions and Speakers:

Sister John Dominic Rasmussen

Sr. John Dominic Rasmussen entered the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecilia in 1982. In 1997, she and three other Sisters founded the Dominican Sisters of Mary, Mother of the Eucharist in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Sister has been involved in Catholic education for over 35 years as both a teacher and administrator. From her experience in administration and as a teacher, she has developed the Disciple of Christ-Education in Virtue program which provides schools, parishes, and families the resources to learn and live a virtuous life in Christ.

Monday Plenary: Taking time in your day to rest and pray

Jonathan Gregg

Jonathan has a B.A. in Mathematics and English from Hillsdale College, an M.A. in Humanities from the University of Chicago, and is currently pursuing a PhD in Mathematics Education from Michigan State University. For the past six years, he has taught in the Mathematics and Education departments at Hillsdale College, and currently holds the position of Visiting Assistant Professor of Education at Hillsdale.

Tuesday Plenary: From Wonder to Wonder: The Shape of Classical Pedagogy

This session will explore the ways in which teachers engage students in learning, the structure and content of classroom conversations, the kinds of relationships that are encouraged and drawn upon, and the nature of the questions that are asked and answered so as to all be aligned with and worthy of the great texts we read and the Christian culture that we embrace. I will provide teachers with practical ways to develop a pedagogy that values both truth and the discovery of truth, that partners the teacher and student together in the educational enterprise, and that seeks to combine experience and expertise to stimulate and cultivate the moral imagination.

Follow-Up Questions: Using the Socratic Method to Press on Student Thinking

Whether asking a student to explain their reasoning, correcting an incorrect response, redirecting their attention to a new idea, or just pressing them for more information, follow-up questions are an essential component of a robust, classical, Socratic pedagogy. This session promises to guide teachers of all disciplines in the different situations that demand a follow-up question, the kinds of follow-up questions that can be effective, and the different ways follow-up questions can be used to make classroom discussions more interesting and productive.

Developing Number Sense in Your Students

This session will attempt to articulate what exactly number sense consists of, to delve deeply into why so many students don't possess it, and finally to provide some concrete ways that teachers can reverse this disturbing trend in mathematics education.

Leveraging Singapore Mathematics for Classical Purposes

Though it was not originally written as a specifically "classical" curriculum, the ideas of Singapore mathematics (a focus on the pictorial approach, a commitment to emphasize conceptual understanding, etc.) seem to dovetail perfectly with classical, Socratic pedagogy. This session looks to hit upon that fusion, identifying ways in which teachers can see Singapore mathematics as rich with opportunities to bring a classical approach to the teaching and learning in their mathematics classrooms.

Unlocking the World of Place Value

One of the most essential components of the K-5 mathematics curriculum is the shift away from counting forward and counting backwards into the realm of place value, the concepts of which must become ingrained in students' minds if they are to master the complexities of the standard algorithms of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. This session will give teachers a vision for their students' transitions into this world of place value and will provide concrete strategies for helping students make this difficult shift seamlessly and fluidly.

Mathematics Forum

This session provides teachers with the opportunity to bring their own questions regarding mathematics teaching and learning. Feel free to come with questions about specific problems, curriculum questions, pedagogical thoughts, mathematical philosophy musings, or, simply come listen in on the discussion.

Tackling the Tricky Problems in Upper School Mathematics

This session promises to tackle a selection of these tricky topics from Pre-Algebra to Pre-Calculus, exploring and discussing student struggles, common pitfalls, and the structure and order of a lesson plan that could bridge the understanding gaps in your students.

Jordan Adams is the Civic Education Specialist for the K-12 Education Office, where he specializes in history and Latin instruction. He has previously taught history, Latin, government, and economics to students ranging from 3rd to 12th grade at Founders Classical Academy of Lewisville in Texas and Saint Agnes School in St. Paul, Minnesota.

American History and Civics in Catholic Schools

What do American civic education and Catholic education have to do with each other, and how does civic education work in a Catholic school? This presentation seeks to answer these questions and more.

Model History Lesson

It's one thing to hear it described and its principles outlined. It's another thing to see it in action. This presentation will offer a model history lesson based on how history is taught in Hillsdale Classical Schools, followed by Q&A.

Key Elements of Social Studies Lessons

Following on the heels of the model lesson, participants in this session will get an inside look at the principles, tips, and tricks employed in teaching history and civics in Hillsdale Classical Schools.

Reimagining Social Studies Assignments and Assessments

Hillsdale College's approach to teaching history involves some refreshing takes on history homework and assessment. This presentation will share some of these ideas, including examples, and discuss some of the best approaches to assignments and testing in history and civics classes.

Jason Barney

Jason is principal of Coram Deo Academy in Carmel, IN. Jason has taught courses from 3rd-12th grades in Latin, Humanities, Math and Science, and Senior Thesis. Jason is the author of A Classical Guide to Narration and The Joy of Learning - Finding Flow Through Classical Education.

The What and Why of Narration

Learn how the pedagogical tool of narration can function as both assimilation and assessment. Then discover the three reasons why using narration regularly in the classroom makes sense from a Christian, classical and learning science perspective: the image of God, the principle of self-education, and retrieval practice.

Steps to Implementing Narration in the Classical Classroom

Narration is so different from common modern education strategies that it can involve a major shift in the teacher's role. Come learn helpful tactics to make the adoption of narration in your classroom a success. Then we will explore the Narration-Trivium lesson structure, as a classical method of organizing your lessons with narration as a centerpiece.

Narration as a Progymnasmata: Turning a Text into a Student Speech

The teaching practice of narration is not only a prime way to absorb new content; it was originally a method used by rhetorical and grammatical teachers to train future orators. Learn how you can turn the content of your classes into impromptu speeches that not only improve your students' understanding, but also their public speaking skills.

Cultivating the Joy of Learning in the Classical Classroom: 5 Strategies to Foster Flow

Most educators desire to foster the love of learning in their students. But when it comes down to it, many teachers don't know what to do differently to help students enjoy learning. Some of the things we're inclined to do, like entertain our students, are counter-productive and against the classical tradition. Come to this session to learn 5 practical strategies for cultivating the joy of learning in your students, whatever level or subject you teach.

Capturing Hearts through the Beauty of Artistry

The process of apprenticing students in various types of artistry is absolutely crucial for capturing their hearts and for their broader intellectual, moral and spiritual growth. Come learn how to apprentice students for artistry, whether in mathematics, fine and performing arts, the language arts, or the common arts!

Attendees will receive a free lesson planning resource called the Apprenticeship Lesson.

Tammy Peters

Tammy was a veteran primary grades teacher and mentor at Mars Hill Academy, a classical Christian school. She is currently the co-author of an English grammar curriculum titled Well- Ordered Language used by Classical schools across the country.

Essential Elements of Teaching Grammar (Grades 3-5)

This workshop covers the essential elements of teaching grammar: *definitional learning, categorial learning, analytical learning, visual learning (diagramming), and wonder*. These elements set the stage of the philosophy and logic behind Well-Ordered Language, the curriculum analytical approach to teaching grammar.

Well-Ordered Language Level 1A: A Look at a Lesson and the Logic (Grades 3-4)

This workshop focuses on the beginning level of Well-Ordered Language and the initial choral analysis, which is at the heart of the program. The participants will take a closer look at Level 1A and review a lesson and practice the choral analysis.

How the Camel Got His Hump and So Much More: A Literature Lesson (Grades 2-3)

This workshop provides a model literature lesson of "How the Camel Got His Hump" by Rudyard Kipling from his *Just So Stories*. The participants will learn more about memorizing poetry, object lessons, cluster words, and may even take part in a short play.

Learning the Language of Grammar: The Eight Parts of Speech (Grades 1-2)

This workshop introduces the eight parts of speech: *nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, preposition, pronouns, conjunctions, interjections* and how they are foundational to learning the language of grammar. The participants will learn that repetition and review breeds curiosity and wonder.

Ian is an educator and Operations Director for Center for Lit, and a graduate of Hillsdale College. Center for Lit offers curriculum materials, online classes, live teacher training, all dedicated to helping readers understand and revel in the beauty of classic books.
